

What is an MBI?

By now you are aware that the current Medicare number, also known as the Health Insurance Claim Number (HICN) is going away, and it is being replaced with a new identifier that will not include a person's social security number.

The new identifier is formally called the Medicare Beneficiary Identifier (MBI). Below is a comparison between the HICN and the MBI.

HICN	MBI
Is a person's Social Security Num- ber.	Is an individual randomly generated alpha-numeric combination and does not contain personally identifiable information.
10-11 characters long	11 characters long
Uses numbers 0-9 Various letters in the English alphabet	Uses numbers 1-9 All letters from A to Z, except for S, L, O, I, B, and Z.
Prefixes and suffixes designate enti- tlement reasons (i.e., aged, disa- bled, ESRD)	No identifiable characters to show reason for entitlement.
More than one beneficiary can have the same SSN in their HICN. Spouses or dependents may have the same HICN with different prefix/suffix.	Each person with Medicare will get their own MBI. Spouses or dependents who may have had similar HICNs will each get their own MBI.
Example HICN: 012345678A A123456789 = RRB	Example MBI: 1EG4-TE5-MK73 RRB will follow same format
